FROM YOUR PASTOR

This month we celebrate the Thanksgiving holiday, and we enjoy an abundance of blessings for which we can be thankful. Most of us also enjoy an abundance of wealth, if we compare ourselves to the average inhabitant of planet Earth. Wealth is usually considered a blessing, but that isn't always the case. In irresponsible hands, wealth can be a curse.

Consider the wisdom reflected in these verses from Proverbs: Two things I ask of you, O LORD; do not refuse me before I die: Keep falsehood and lies far from me; give me neither poverty nor riches, but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown you and say, "Who is the LORD?" Or I may become poor and steal, and so dishonor the name of my God (Prov. 30:7-9; NIV). Biblical wisdom suggests that it's good to have neither too little nor too much, lest our relationship with God suffer as a result.

Billionaire investor Warren Buffet is quoted as saying he wants to leave his children enough money that they can afford to do whatever they want, but not enough that they can afford to do nothing. Even this secular financial guru recognizes that having too much can be a bad thing if we don't possess the wisdom to handle it. He's given billions of dollars to charity and lives much more modestly than you might expect.

High-living prosperity preachers don't seem to share the concern of the writer of the proverb, however. They are unfortunately more than willing to "fleece the flock" to elevate their lifestyles. In contrast, Pastor Rick Warren has given away

much of the wealth he earned through the phenomenal success of his best-selling book, *The Purpose Driven Life*. He repaid his church all the money they had paid him over the years as their pastor, stopped accepting a salary from the church, and he became what he calls a "reverse tither"—that is, he gives 90% of his income to the church and lives on 10%. And his lifestyle remains modest compared to other religious leaders of similar means. Now, if you ask me which of those religious leaders has the better understanding of God and his word, Rick Warren would get my vote, for obvious reasons.

I once read the words of a guy who said that when he was younger, he always wanted a Porsche, his "absolutely favorite car." But when he reached his late 30's, he had developed a more mature list of what makes him happy: "(1) Seeing my wife smile; (2) seeing my kids smile; (3) helping people; (4) reading; (5) going to church; (6) sitting around with my family, doing nothing; and (7) watching the kids play (nicely)." He says, "It's funny how most of [those things] have nothing to do with money."

In this month of Thanksgiving, give thanks to God for what you have . . . and for what you don't!

Once the Ministry Plan is approved staff may move forward with final plans for the coming year. I love moving forward!

Central Baptist Church has developed a Ministry Plan for 2023. The total of that plan is \$1,957,210.84 or a 0.6% increase over 2022. You will find a brochure at the Welcome Desk that unpacks our plan for the new year. It might be helpful to know the steps to developing and implementing our new Ministry Plan:

1—Staff and ministry leaders submit spending requests by mid-August.

2—The Administrator compiles the requests for submission to and approval by the budget sub-committee in September.

3—The Board of Directors review and approve the Ministry Plan in October.

4—The plan will be discussed at the Quarterly Business Meeting on November 2.

5—The plan will be approved by a Lord's Day Vote on Sunday, November 6.

You will find attached to your copy of the 2023 Ministry Plan Brochure a copy of a 2023 Giving Options Selection Card. Be sure to complete that card and drop it in the black contribution boxes or by giving it to Kirsten Borger in the front office. Thank you for your financial support of Central Baptist Church's Ministry Plan.

Finally, I love November because it is a time of planning adjustments for the new year. Although we have enjoyed DNA groups now for two years it is time to allow new opportunities for these groups to married couples. Therefore, we will offer DNA 2.0 in January. These groups will be composed of a leader couple and up to four additional couples. All the other "rules" of DNA groups will apply, but we have heard the voices of many couples who wish to be together through this process. Be sure to take advantage of one of these groups in the new year.

CBC Orchestra and Friends Concert Recap – Sunday, October 23, 2022

WOW! What a marvelous afternoon of worship, praise and PURE JOY! Our orchestra blesses us most every week as they accompany our congregational singing and share meditations and preludes but we rarely get to enjoy an hour of their wonderful playing. Sunday's concert was the most beautiful and meaningful I can remember. Thank you CBC Orchestra and Rachel Cox for all the hard work, planning and coordination to make this GREAT worship event a reality.

Individual musicians from this group provide most of the solos and duets offered as meditations in worship. For 26 years these dedicated church men and women have faithfully prepared and served in our church and around the world as they have gone on mission to at least 5 countries for more than 10 different outreach and teaching events. Our folks make up almost 10% of the Johnson City Community Concert Band and some play in both the Johnson City and Kingsport Symphonies. Our church choir combined with four others from Greeneville, Jonesborough and Kingsport for a regional concert in May of this year featuring the music of award-winning Christian composer Mary McDonald. The orchestral accompaniment was provided by our folks and individual players from four other churches; this concert was an opportunity for a reunion and to combine their talents once again. Rachel Cox, our CBC Orchestra director, led the group in preparation of Sunday's concert and also did so for the presentation in May.

In a loving and self-deprecating fashion, our group often refers to themselves as the "RSF": The Roan Street Filharmonic. But the light humor of that moniker belies the deep commitment to our Lord and offering musical excellence to Him whenever the opportunity arises. I am inspired, challenged and encouraged by this fine group every week and am so very grateful to be part of a church family that loves, supports and provides a place for them to thrive. Very few churches have such a group and almost none as dedicated and accomplished.

I'm grateful Joyce Dean Garrison came to our church and started our orchestra in 1997 and that Rachel Cox has conducted, grown and shepherded them for more than 20 years. Soli Deo Gloria: To God Be the Glory!

PARISH NURSE UPDATE

If Fall is here, then Winter cannot be far behind! Are you moving onto this season in good spirits or struggling? Many people struggle with the change of seasons and there is a very real basis for this: seasonal depression, also called Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). This type of depression is triggered by the change of seasons, and most commonly begins in late fall. Symptoms include feelings of sadness, lack of energy, loss of interest in usual activities, oversleeping and weight gain. Fortunately, all of these symptoms can be treated.

We all face different emotions based on our circumstances. Not everyone who is sad has Seasonal Affective Disorder. The holidays are difficult for many. Do you dwell in the negative or the positive? Do you stay active or do you withdraw when faced with challenges? Do you take your concerns to the Lord? Do you also give thanks for what you have? The Bible guides us in all circumstances. In Psalm 46:1, the psalmist says, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble."

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 says "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." Pray about your concerns, but also give thanks.
